The angry driver jumped out of his car, grabbed the nearest child and pushed him up against a parked car shouting "What was all that about, and who are you? Just what the heck are you doing . That's a new car and that brick you threw is going to cost me a lot of money. Why did you do it?"

The young boy was very apologetic. "Please, mister...please, I'm sorry but I didn't know what else to do." He pleaded, "I threw the brick because no one else would stop."

For those who don't know, our mission partner is Fiona Kendall. She visited both Knockando and Rothes churches back in

2017 prior to her starting mission work in Italy. Fiona works in Rome with Mediterranean Hope, a refugee project—created by the Federation of Protestant Churches in Italy (FCEI). Her background in European law and voluntary work with asylum seekers has helped to equip for her role as Mediterranean Hope's European & Legal Affairs Advisor.

Fiona has strong links with the Church of Scotland where she grew up, and the Methodist Church, where she played an active part during a decade spent in Yorkshire. Hers is an ecumenical appointment with the Methodist Church.

TOAST AND MARMALADE SUNDAY

This simple resource for Fairtrade Fortnight or beyond is to support Fiona Kendall and her work with Mediterranean Hope's Migrant Programme in Calabria. CRAFT GROUP



Having asked one or two people, who were into crafts, if they would be interested in a craft group and getting a positive response, I advertised the first meeting of the craft group to be held in Rothes Kirk Hall on Monday 17th April in the afternoon from 2pm—4pm.

We meet every second Monday afternoon and the numbers vary between five and eight people. People can choose to do their own craft, so we have some knitting, some crocheting, some sewing and one painting. It is nice for people to get out, have a blether whilst doing something they enjoy, and of course we finish the afternoon with a cup of tea or coffee.

At the first meeting people also brought along items they had already made, so after only three meetings we were able to post a selection of blankets, jackets, hats and bonding squares to the neo-natal unit at Ninewells Hospital, Dundee.

'What is a bonding square?' I hear you ask. They are crocheted or knitted squares. One is put on the premature baby and the mum wears the other next to her skin. The squares have to be identical in size, colour and type of wool. After a day the squares are swapped so that the baby gets the smell of the mother and so the bonding process begins.


The church craft group is open to anyone with an interest in crafts. It costs £2 a session and this is to cover the cost of postage of items, for example.

Church Development

In September 2022, the Presbytery Plan for Moray was decided in Moray Presbytery. This Plan was submitted to the Church of Scotland's governance group where it was rejected. Moray Presbytery then reviewed the Plan on 29th November 2022. After some amendments they re-submitted the revised Plan.

For Rothes Kirk the Plan included for the dissolving of the linkage with Knockando Kirk and establishing a new linkage with Mortlach and Cabrach Kirk. Whilst for Knockando Kirk, the dissolving of the linkage with Rothes Kirk and the establishment of a linkage with Aberlour Kirk.



It is understood that the responsible committee in the Presbytery is continuing in dialogue with the Church of Scotland but to date no revision to the Presbytery's Proposed Plan has been formulated.

Firmly Planted: Agroforestry for Sustainability

Firmly Planted is a community-based agroforestry initiative with the ambition of making a sustainable impact across Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. It is spearheaded by our partners in the Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP), and built around the church's community structures. The initiative will resource individual groups to respond to the various challenges affecting Malawi today.

Agroforestry presents an opportunity to address challenges of food insecurity, deforestation, climate change and youth unemployment. Tree nurseries create employment opportunities, fruit trees improve nutrition and wider tree planting helps mitigate the impact of the climate crisis, in turn improving agricultural productivity.

Firmly Planted will provide community-based training tailored to the community's needs, ensuring woodlots are well maintained to have the greatest chance to thrive. The programme, through effective distribution, looks to attain large-scale tree planting of locally relevant woodlots – these could be linked to schools, churches, clinics and community groups. Having already established a pilot tree nursery, CCAP is looking to replicate this across the Synods by implementing Central Tree Nursery Hubs allowing each nursery to grow tree seedlings based on the needs of their communities.

Our mission partner, Gary Brough, is one of the project coordinators and is looking for opportunities to grow the project. You can keep up to date with Gary's work on the <u>Mission Partner page of the website</u>. The Guild is also involved in supporting this programme.

This year stamp appeal proceeds will go towards establishing the tree nurseries. Your stamps can be handed into Rothes Kirk Hall or to Sheila Brumby, 22 New Street, Rothes.
