## The Christingle Story

Christingles are oranges with a band of red tape around the middle, decorated with dried fruit or sweets, with a candle on the top. It's his-



tory can be traced back to a Moravian bishop, Johannes de Watteville, who started the tradition in Germany in 1747 when, during an Advent service he gave each child in the congregation a small candle wrapped in a red ribbon.

This is also where the name Christingle comes from—the German 'Christkindl' means Christ child. The candle and ribbon developed into the Christingle as we know it today and became popular in Europe. It was begun in Britain at Lincoln Cathedral in 1948 and became popular in the latter years of the 20th century.

Each element of a Christingle has a special meaning that helps to tell the Christian story: the orange represents the world, the red ribbon (or tape) symbolises the love and blood of Christ, the four cocktail sticks with sweets and dried fruit represent the four corners of the earth and the fruits of God's creation, and the lit candle represents Jesus Christ, 'the Light of the world' who brings hope to people living in darkness.



As the prophet Isaiah wrote, 'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness—on them light has shined.' Isaiah 9:2

Dear Friends,

I recall reading an article which posed the question "What is Christmas all about?" We could answer by saying, "Christmas is the Church's celebration of the birth of God's Son, Jesus Christ." But then how do we explain the reindeer, the tinsel, the bright lights, the Christmas trees and the Santas? Our problem is the simple fact that with so many people changing and adapting it for their own use and profit it's easy to forget what Christmas is really about.

Maybe asome words from the prophet Isaiah can help us grasp the wonder of the coming of Jesus into our world.

For unto us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government will be upon his shoulder, and his name will be called, "Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

Perhaps the title Prince of Peace takes us to the heart of what Christmas is all about? But Christmas is much more than the remembrance of the birth of a baby long ago. Christmas is about God's plan for peace on this earth.

Wishing youy all a blessed Christmas as we celebrate the birth of our Saviour, the greatest gift of all—may hope, peace, joy and love be yours this Christmas and in the coming year.

## The Twelve Days of Christmas.

What in the world do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans and especially a partridge, who won't come out of the pear tree, have to do with Christmas?

From 1558 until 1829 Roman Catholics were not permitted to practise their faith openly. Someone during that time wrote this carol as a catechism for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning plus a hidden meaning only to members of the Church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality, which the children could remember.

The partridge in the pear tree was Jesus Christ.

Two turtle doves, the Old and New Testaments.

Three French hens stood for Faith, Hope and Love.

Four calling birds, the four Gospels Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.

Five gold rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.

Six geese a-laying stood for six days of creation.

Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit— Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership and Mercy.

Eight maids a-milking were the eight Beatitudes.

Nine Ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit—Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness and Self Control.

Ten Lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.

Eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.

Twelve drummers drumming symbolised the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

#### **CRAFT GROUP**



Our church craft group has continued to meet every second Monday and although it is a church group all are welcome. Most of those attending do knitting but some also do crocheting, sewing or painting. October and the first week of November we were busy making up Christmas boxes for Blytheswood.

We have decided that over the winter months we shall knit squares to make into blankets and donate them to local people who are housebound and anyone who feels a blanket would help keep them warm. Also if you know of anyone who would benefit from a blanket please let me know.

Anyone can knit a square at home if they want to and donate it to the craft group either by leaving it in the hall on a Monday morning or I or any member of the craft group can collect it.

The square should be knitted in double knitting and measure 8 inches square. Cast on 35 to 40 stitches and use size 4mm needles (8 in old size). Some DK wools are thinner than others so if you want to add more stitches the please feel free to do so. If you wish to knit or crochet a square but have never knitted or crocheted before come along to our craft group and we will show you what to do.

If you wish to help but don't want to knit/crochet you can always donate unwanted double knitting wool to the group.

By the way this group is open to people from Knockando, Elchies and Archiestown. You are all most welcome.
